In democratic societies, decision-making is based on the political and social participation of their members. As a normative reference, democracy implies a demand that all individuals be able to realize their destiny while being responsible for their own choices. Hence, the decision about who is a member of a society and accordingly, who can take part in its decision-making, is a central problem in democratic societies. The facts of high mobility and of the diversity of migration movements indicate that the assumption of permanent residence within a single nation-state that underlies most traditional concepts of democracy simply does not apply for many people.

Therefore, new questions about political, social and cultural affiliations to nation-states and societies arise. Governmental regulation of the political affiliation through citizenship, established by modern nation-states, turns out to be problematic. For most immigrants, such regulation excludes them from democratic participation in the country in which they live either temporarily or permanently. In addition, the question arises of the extent to which political affiliation qua citizenship is sufficient to allow appropriate participation in democratic societies. Despite the liberal granting of citizenship to migrants, as the example of France, for instance, shows, social and cultural distinctions still function that can lead to their devaluation and exclusion. Do societies now also need new strategies for social and cultural equality alongside political participation in order to enforce democracy in its institutional as well as extra-institutional forms?

Against this background, questions arise about the meaning and effects of migration for democratic societies and the implications of different democratic demands for migration societies: What different kinds of development appear in this context? Of what importance are the missing participation rights of migrants in democratic societies? How important is the gender gap in the context of migration and democracy? How is participation to be improved at all political levels and what developments are discernible in different societies? What different kinds of development appear in different nation-states? What concepts of democracy are articulated in migration policy?

At the 12<sup>th</sup> International Conference, different interdisciplinary and international approaches to these questions will be presented and discussed with regard of future developments in modern societies.

### Getting there

By train from Luxembourg (Direction Bettembourg-Volmerange) to Dudelange Centre.  
Journey approximately 20 minutes, day tickets from 4 €, timetable on [www.cfl.lu](http://www.cfl.lu)  
Town Hall in walking distance (5 minutes); across the railway and straight on.

By car via highway Luxembourg-Metz  
Take the exit Dudelange-Centre and follow the signs to the town hall (Hôtel de Ville)  
Free parking next to the town hall.

### Getting there

The city of Luxembourg is easily accessible by international trains or flights.

The museum is located in the historic city centre of Luxembourg (UNESCO-World Heritage).  
From the train station it is in walking distance (20 minutes) or a short bus ride (line 20).

The city centre is not car-friendly as there are only a few parking lots. Parking is available around the centre (Knuedler, Saint-Esprit or Aldringen). Follow the signs of the park-routing system.  
The free «Glacis»-Parking is in walking distance from the museum (15 minutes).
